

## Knollmead PE and Sport Premium Grant 2018/19

The PE and sport premium is designed to help primary schools improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils.

### **What is the PE and Sports Grant?**

The Education Funding Agency is providing additional funding to each school to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport – is allocated to Primary School Headteachers. This funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools.

### **Knollmead Primary School PE and Sports Grant**

Funding for schools is calculated by reference to the number of primary-aged pupils (between the ages of 5 and 11), as recorded in the annual school census in January 2018. For this academic year Knollmead Primary is receiving £17,790.

### **Purpose of funding**

Schools must spend the additional funding on improving their provision of PE and sport, but they will have the freedom to choose how they do this.

Possible uses for the funding might include:

- hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers when teaching PE;
- supporting and engaging the least active children through new or additional Change4Life clubs;
- paying for professional development opportunities for teachers in PE and sport;
- providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE and sport;
- running sport competitions, or increasing pupils' participation in School Games;
- buying quality assured professional development modules or materials for PE and sport;
- providing some places for pupils on after school sports clubs; and holiday clubs.

Use of the 2018/19 PE and Sports Grant allocation for Knollmead Primary School has been planned to cover the following:

1. Specialist coaches to work alongside teachers when teaching PE (Fitness4schools) or delivering swimming (Splish n' splash) (approx. £4,000)
2. Costs to participate in Kingston Schools Sport Partnership (KSSP) competition programme (approx. £400)
3. Transport to events (approx. £250)
4. Staff training throughout the year (CPD) via KSSP and Youth Sports Trust (approx. £500)
5. Improve PE resources (approx. £100)
6. Provide sports equipment for lunch break (approx. £740)
7. Provide places for identified pupils for after school sports clubs (approx. £900)
8. Provide additional outdoor challenge equipment for Early Years and the ASD Resource Provision (£10,000)

### **Last year's spending of PE and sports premium grant**

### **Impact of last year's spending of PE and sports premium grant**

Increased pupil participation in competitive events against other schools.

- 77% of the school (Reception - y6) represented the school in at least one sporting competition.
- 78% of the pupils in receipt of the pupil premium grant (Reception - y6) represented the school in at least one sporting competition.
- The sport with the greatest level of participation in Years 5 & 6 was football for both girls and boys; this trend was also reflected in Years 3 & 4.
- Increased participation of pupils eligible for the pupil premium grant: 13/14 PPG in Years 5 & 6 pupils attended at least one extra-curricular club this academic year and 6 attended two.
- Staff surveys show that 100% of staff who have received Fitness4Schools additional training have found it beneficial and have reported increased confidence in delivering PE sessions.
- Physical challenge equipment purchased for Early Years and ASD pupils resulting in increased progress in their movement and gross motor skills.
- Additional sports equipment purchased for social times has increased pupil participation in sports and physical activity at break and lunchtime.

### **Sustainability**

Sustainability will be achieved through staff training, additional resources, development of staff capacity and increased pupil participation and interest. The evaluation of the impact will inform and secure sustainable improvements in provision, delivery and uptake.
